

Class Sharing Policy

The Technology Excellence in Education Network (TEEN), an educational technology consortium comprised of U.S.D. #397 Centre, U.S.D. #398 Peabody-Burns, U.S.D. #408 Marion-Florence, U.S.D. #410 Durham-Hillsboro-Lehigh, and U.S.D. #487 Herington offers Interactive Distance Learning (IDL) classes to students in the member districts.

Existing technology and the Kan-ed network allow school districts to connect around the state. If other school districts would like to participate in TEEN courses, the following policies will regulate the exchange.

High School to High School:

There will be a contract between high schools' from both sending and receiving districts.

Class Size:

No more than 24 students may be enrolled in one class without the consent of the TEEN Director who will consult with and consider input from the originating teacher and both sending and receiving site principals. Because camera capabilities limit the number of students clearly visible at some remote sites, no more than ten students may be enrolled at a remote site without the consent of the TEEN Director who will consult with and consider input from the originating teacher and both sending and receiving site principals.

Remote Locations:

The number of remote sites that can be effectively handled may vary depending on the subject matter, the individual students involved, and the teacher. The number of remote sites will be limited to three. Sending courses to more than three remote sites must be approved by the TEEN Director who will consult with and consider input from the originating teacher and both sending and receiving site principals.

Student Contracts:

High standards of behavior are expected from students participating in the instructional classes provided by TEEN. All students enrolled in TEEN courses are expected to sign and abide by the TEEN Student Enrollment Contract.
